Course Components

How To Study

This study has twelve chapters, and each chapter has its own exam. Begin by asking God to help you understand the material. Read the chapter through at least twice, once to get a general idea of its contents and then again, slowly, looking up any Bible references given.

Begin studying immediately, or if you are in a group, as soon as the group begins. We suggest that you keep a regular schedule by trying to complete at least one chapter per week.

Exams

In the exam booklet there is one exam for each chapter (exam 1 covers chapter 1 of the course). Do not answer the questions by what you think or have always believed. The questions are designed to find out if you understand the material given in the course.

After you have completed each chapter, review the related exam and see how well you know the answers. If you find that you are having difficulty answering the questions, review the material until you think you can answer the questions. It is important that you read the Bible passages referenced as some questions may be based on the Bible text.

How Your Exams Are Graded

Your instructor will mark any incorrectly answered questions. You will be referred back to the place in the course where the correct answer is to be found. After finishing this course with a passing average, you will be awarded a certificate.

If you enrolled in a class, submit your exam papers to the leader or secretary of the class who will send them for the entire group to the Correspondence School.

Doing God's WILL

READ MARK CHAPTER 1

Mark tells the story of the life of the Lord Jesus, the greatest Servant of God. Jesus always pleased His Father, in everything that He did.

In verses 1 to 11, we see that John lived near the River Jordan and baptized all who came and said they were sinners. One day Jesus came, though He was not a sinner. When He was baptized, God said He was well pleased with Jesus. After this Satan tried to make Jesus sin (verses 12 and 13). We learn from other parts of the Bible that Jesus did not sin.

Then Jesus found four men and called them to come with Him and become servants of God (verses 14 to 20). They left everything and went with Jesus. They wanted to learn what is true, and to help Jesus in His work for God.

In the town of Capernaum, Jesus went into the Synagogue and made a man well who had an unclean spirit in him. Then He went into the house and found a woman who was ill. This woman was the mother of Simon Peter's wife. Jesus took her hand and made her well at once (verses 21 to 31). Then many people came to Jesus to get well. Jesus loved them all and helped all who came to Him. God loves men, and Jesus, who is His true Servant, loved them too.

After that a poor leper came to Jesus and wanted to be made well. To be a leper is a very bad thing. No leper can get well by himself. Today only a very good doctor can help. If a leper does not get help he will slowly die. A leper is like a man who has done wrong before God. He is a sinner and needs someone to save him from his sins. If he dies in his sins, he cannot be saved.

This leper did right when he came to Jesus to be made well. He said, "If you are willing, You can make me clean." He knew Jesus was able to make him well, but was not sure if He was willing to do so. But Jesus answered at once, "I am willing; be cleansed." He put His hand on him and made him well. So we see that Jesus loved him and also that He was able to make him well. From this story we learn that God loves us and Jesus can save us from sin.
